President's Letter

Cherokee Camp Out - One of the new events for 2004 is a camp out on Cherokee on Saturday June 5 at the May Springs campground on the North shore of Cherokee lake. This location was selected as the stripers should be in this area in early June. We have rented a pavilion and two adjacent camping spots on the lake so there will be plenty of room. Allan Franklin Annual Kids' Fishing Day -

The name of the Kids Fishing Day has been changed to the Allan Franklin Annual Kids' Fishing Day to recognize the work that Allan has done in promoting this event over the years. This year's event will be on Sunday, June 6, which is the day following the Cherokee Camp Out. We will launch from the pavilion that we have rented at the May Springs campground. Fishing Below Dams

I received the following warning via an E-mail from **www.tennesseeSportsman.com**. It is quite timely considering that the fishing below the dams will pick up considerably as the weather gets warmer.

"A large amount of water can be discharged through a dam without warning at any time. For example, when the demand for electricity is high, the turbines that generate electricity at a dam may start automatically, resulting in a significant increase in the flow of water within only a matter of seconds. Similarly, river operations for flood control can create rapidly rising water levels in otherwise shallow riverbeds, especially below tributary dams, which are usually located in steep terrain.

The cold water released through tributary dams even during the summer may also be a hazard. Cold water temperatures can result in shock and hypothermia, and slippery rocks and hidden holes can cause an unexpected fall. Take special precautions when fishing below a dam by boat. The water can boil suddenly, trapping or capsizing unprepared boaters. Always wear a Personal Flotation Device, and leave the motor running - even if drift fishing. A stalled or hard-to-start motor can result in disaster. Never anchor your boat in the area below the dam. A sudden surge of water can pull a boat under and sink it before you have a chance to pull the anchor and move to safety. Stay out of restricted areas. Plan a quick exit from the water to the nearest bank in case of an emergency. Move to a safer area immediately if a siren sounds or strobe lights flash at dams equipped with theses warning devices. Wear your lifejacket and do not overload your boat."

I would like to add one comment to the above and that concerns fishing below the dams when water is going over the spillways. **Don't do it - just turn around and go somewhere else.** Water going over the spillway adds an additional element of danger and it's not worth the additional risk.

Letter from the Vice President

Nasty Weather

To follow the safety theme a bit further it is time to consider extreme weather conditions. It is not uncommon in East Tennessee to have Spring and Summer thunderstorms that can create extreme conditions on waterways. Sometimes these storms pop up with little or no warning. If you are boating in areas well known to you, it may not be a problem. If you venture to remote locations or new areas, it would be wise to take a few precautions.

First, have some means to contact help in case of an emergency. The modern day answer is the cell phone. Keep in mind that there are no cell towers in the lakes and in remote areas. Another option is a marine radio. If you are going to remote areas or to a new area, having both is a good idea. Cell phones can summon help from miles away if you can get a signal. Marine radios have a limited range but operate without any outside assistance (towers). You can usually get a message through to someone who can get help to you using one or the other.

Second, have some idea of an escape plan. If a storm pops up, where do you seek shelter - any port in a storm so to speak. Take a map, compass and/or GPS. I make a point to plot escape routes in good weather that I can use in less than perfect conditions. One nice feature on most good marine radios is a NOAA weather band. In extreme weather conditions these folks can pinpoint storms and give advanced warning of the storm's path. More than once I have been anchored up at night and been alerted to a storm coming. A few minutes listening to the NOAA folks can give me a clue as to the direction to take to get clear. I have used a marine radio for weather information at home during times when traditional weather sources are off due to power failure or satellite interference.

These items cost money but usually last a long time and pay for themselves over and over again in dangerous situations. Think about it.



Boating & Fishing Safety Seminar

The primary focus of the TSBA April 19th monthly meeting was a seminar by Ken Cutsinger of the TWRA on boating & fishing safety. Ken did an excellent job, and I think we all found the meeting to be interesting and informative. We thank Ken for taking the time to prepare for and present this presentation. Here are some of the facts that were covered.

Boating under the Influence:

- * It is unlawful for anyone to operate a boat under the influence of alcohol or drugs.
- * All persons operating a boat have given their implied consent to a sobriety test.
- * The legal limit for your blood alcohol level is 0.1%

Young Operators: Persons under 12 years of age may not operate a boat unless accompanied by an adult who can take immediate control the vessel. There are some exceptions for boats with small motors.

Reckless Operation: Examples of reckless operation are:

- * Operating a boat in a swimming area
- * Riding on seat backs, gunwales, transoms or pedestal seats while moving above idle speed.
- * Excessive speed in crowded areas, dangerous areas or during restricted visibility.
- * Operating an overloaded vessel

Owner's Responsibility: The owner of a boat may be responsible for any injury or damage done by his or her boat whether or not the owner is present. This does not hold true if the vessel is used without the owner's consent.

Accidents: All accidents involving property damage in excess of \$500 must be reported to the TWRA within 10 days. All accidents involving death or injury requiring medical treatment must be reported within 48 hours.

Guides: Before a person may carry passengers for hire on the navigable waters of the United States, an appropriate license must be obtained from the Coast Guard. Only Type I PFD's are acceptable when carrying passengers for hire.

Safety Seminar - Cont.

Life Jackets Below Dams: A US. Coast Guard approved PFD must be worn by each person on a vessel being operated within specifically marked areas below dams.

No Wake Areas:

- * Unless otherwise marked, all vessels operating within 300 feet of a commercial boat dock must do so at a slow wake speed regardless of whether or not the area is marked by buoys.
- * "No Wake" is defined as a vessel traveling at or below idle speed or at such speed that the boat or its wake is not sufficient to cause possible injury or damage to other persons, boats or property.

Personal Flotation Devices (PFD):

- * All children under the age of 12 years of age are required to wear a Coast Guard approved life jacket if the vessel is under way. It is not required if the boat is anchored, moored or aground.
- * You must have one wearable device of the appropriate size on board for each person in the boat or each person being towed.
- * Each device must be readily available. It must not be hidden below deck or stored in plastic bags. They should be worn or close at hand where they can be reached quickly in an emergency.
- * Each device must be Coast Guard approved and bear the approval stamp.
- * Each device must be in good condition and be of an appropriate size for the person intended to wear it. The straps must be firmly affixed, there should be no rips, tears or holes which will affect the operating efficiency
- * Ski belts are **NOT** on the approved list of flotation devices. **Inflatable PFDs** Some inflatable PFDs are acceptable provided it is Coast Guard approved as a type V and it is being worn.

These devices are not approved for persons under 16 years of age unless it is specifically stated on the manufacture's label.

Also, please remember that inflatable devices are slow to inflate in cold weather or water.

June Expectations

The reservoir stripers have finished the spawn run and continue to move slowly downstream as the thermocline gets deeper. Top water action is in the early morning or not at all, but a good fish finder will start showing the schools of stripers that are deep enough not to shy away from the boat. The confluence of the major creeks and old river channel near mid lake are good target areas. The large, shallow flats that transition quickly to deep water are also excellent places for stripers to hold. The stripers normally feed aggressively after the spawn is complete. Catch and release starts to become questionable this month; however, in the the tailrace and rivers below dams you will be able to release successfully during most of the early summer. The stripers will continue to migrate to the tailrace discharge the entire month of June and should be great by month end.

Cumberland River Excursion

The first annual Cumberland River excursion was held over the weekend of May 1, and it was a huge success. Over 20 members from four states converged upon the Budget Inn in Carthage for some striper fishing on the Cumberland River both upstream and downstream from Cordell Hull Dam. Most of the stripers were caught just below the dam in the swift current. The action was fantastic on Friday afternoon, and everyone was catching one striper after another. I landed five and I had two more snap my 17 lb. test line - which was quickly changed to 25 lb. test line on Friday night. The fishing below the dam cooled off considerably on Saturday, and only the real "Below the Dam" pros were having any luck. One member caught 11 fish on Saturday, but a lot of us were skunked. Some members had a good day further downstream near the confluence of the Cumberland and the Caney Fork Rivers. Bait was fairly easy to catch at the dam. The shad were big and a lot of people were successfully angling for Skipjack. As far as I could tell, we were good stewards of the waters and the surrounding land as we left the area as we found it. Most, if not all, of the members released all of their fish. Almost everyone indicated that they would return in the future and that this was an excellent learning experience. In fact, there was some talk about planning another trip back to this area in the fall. The camraderie was great and everyone seemed to enjoy seeing some of their long-lost buddies. Contrary to what the weather reports were indicating, the weather was fine on Friday and Saturday, but heavy rains did dampen some spirits on Sunday. Basically it was a fun trip and, if you weren't able to join us, then you missed out on a wonderful weekend. Don't miss the next TSBA event.



33 Bridge downstream to Point #19 on the Clinch side. Below Point #14 at Blue Springs downstream to Point #11 below Springs Dock on the Powell side. Look on the inside bends of the river and in front of the major coves with creek feeds.

BELOW FORT LOUDON & MELTON HILL DAMS: Good and Improving

Many of the stripers will go upstream to the discharge at the dams. Put your sinker and hook close to the bottom with plans to lose a few for the most catches. Pulling side planer boards down the banks can also catch fish for miles downstream.
