President's Letter

Norris Lake Update - As you know, the TSBA and Norris Lake Advisory Committee have been working with the TWRA to develop a plan to help the Norris Lake striper fishery recover more rapidly from the big fish die-off that occurred last summer and fall. The TWRA is studying all of the various alternatives and they have indicated that they will recommend some changes for Norris. The details are not available at this time.

Open Fishing - For the second "Open Fishing" day, on Saturday May 22, we assembled at the boat ramp just South of the Cherokee Dam at 4:30 PM and we fished the humps around the dam. The schools of stripers were scattered but they were thick once you found them, and they were readily hitting the shad. While only four boats participated, everyone had a great time. Remember that these events are not sponsored by the TSBA so you can bring your neighbors or any of your nonmember friends. Hopefully, the word will get out as to how much fun we are having and the participation will increase. If not, the members who do show up will be treated to some great fishing and camraderie. The next "Open Fishing" date will be on Saturday, July 24; and we will be fishing below Melton Hill and Fort Loudoun Dams. The details and time will be discussed at the next TSBA meeting on June 21st at Shoney's. Some out-of-state members have expressed an interest in this event.

Cumberland River Trip - The Cumberland River Excursion which occurred on May 01 & 02 was very well received especially by our out-of-state members. In fact, several people talked about going back in the fall. 
Life Jackets - One thing that I noticed on our trip to the Cumberland is how many people dislike wearing a life jacket. As you know, it is the law in Tennessee that you must wear a Coast Guard approved life jacket when fishing below the dams. However, I saw TSBA members who did not wear a life jacket and others who had them on but they were not zipped or snapped into place. The problem is that most life jackets are not comfortable and they tend to make you quite warm if the sun is shining. As a result, I searched through my many catalogs to see if I could find a more comfortable life jacket. One that caught my eye was in Cabela's catalog and they called it their "Ultimate Full-Motion Vest". I purchased one for myself and it is quite comfortable. They have opened up the arm pit area and this really works for me. In fact, I will start using this jacket even when I am not below the dams. It's a little pricey at \$49.95 but, to me, it's worth it. I plan to buy more for all of the people on my boat. I will bring this vest to the next meeting so you can try it on and see if it works for you.

Next Meeting - Remember that the next meeting will be back at Shoney's on June 21 at the regular time of 6 PM for the social hour and 7 PM for the actual meeting. This will be an important meeting as we will decide if we are going to go back to the Cumberland this fall and the exact format of the outing below the dams on July 24.

Salt Concentration - Recently, I took a small survey of some of the more experienced members of the club to determine what salt concentration they used in their bait tanks. The overwhelming response was 1/2 cup per every 10 gallons of water. I also checked the label on a bottle of "Shad Keeper" and they recommend the same concentration. They also said that you could double the amount of salt to one cup for every 10 gallons if the bait was in bad shape. I was using twice this concentration.

What are those silly-looking yellow, orange and black things that you now see on rods of Ezell, Allan and Bob. I have been asked that question by at least 10 different club members. They may look a little odd, but their value will really be appreciated if your rod happens to go overboard unexpectedly. They are closed-cell foam rod flotation devices designed to slip over your rod and provide it with enough flotation to keep it from sinking. Simply slip them over the lower end of your rod and use the Velcro straps to secure them in place. They are available in two different sizes - one for full-size rods & reels and another for ultra-lites. Both Cabela's and Bass Pro Shops carry them in their catalogs, and they retail for around \$9.00 for a three-pack. That's pretty cheap insurance to pay for your favorite rod and reel. I first started using them in Arizona after I left one of my rods on the rear deck and headed back to the boat ramp. Somewhere along the way, it bounced out and there was no reason to look for it. Be sure to check and be sure that it is providing enough flotation for your particular rod and reel combination.

Conserve Striped Bass!

How you can help!

Anglers should determine whether to keep or release fish depending on the conditions of the catch. Released striped bass survival is based on your knowledge of the species and the circumstances of the catch. If you take time to learn more about these phenomena and we work together, we can be assured of excellent striper fishing for many years to come.

Keep striped bass from June through September. Releasing striped bass during these hot months can generally cause death of many released fish. This is the best season to catch and keep your limit, then either quit or fish for another species.

Release striped bass from October through May. Striped bass can generally be released without harm during these cooler months of the year when surface water temperatures are more suitable. Releasing fish will help increase the number and size of striped bass.

Good Angling Practices

- * Plan a "keep or release" strategy each day and before removing each fish from the water.
- * Use corrodible circle, barbless, or treble hooks.
 They do not hook fish deeply and allow fish to
 be released more quickly.
- Use heavy tackle designed for stripers and a steady retrieval technique.
- * Minimize handling and out of water time. If you must handle a fish, use a wet glove or rag to hold it and use proper hook removal tools to facilitate quick release.
- * Cut leaders closely to release deeply hooked fish.
- * Release fish gently head first, supporting tail with a filet glove on hand, if possible.
- * Resuscitate an exhausted fish by moving back and forth in water forcing water through gills.
- * Keep fish to eat during warmer months.
- Practice release in cooler months.
- Teach release techniques to your buddies.

Keep or Release

Keep the fish you will use; return the rest for enjoyment another day.

Causes of Release Mortality

Landlocked striped bass, being out of their native environment, require more care in release situations than many other freshwater fish.

One cause of mortality is called Acidosis. During periods of exertion, fish muscle obtains energy by breaking down sugars without the presence of abundant oxygen. This results in the formation of toxic substances in greater quantities than the liver can cleanse. This condition limits the ability of the blood to pick up and transport oxygen throughout the fish. If this condition is not reversed in the revival period of the release process, the fish may not survive.

Additional mortality factors are related to pressure changes as a fish is brought to the surface from deep water. This pressure change causes over-inflation of the swim bladder. To survive this ordeal, fish must wait on the surface for the swim bladder to deflate. During this time the fish is subject to further stress by warm temperatures and harmful ultraviolet rays. Pressure change can also cause paralysis or death as air bubbles form in the bloodstream and create an embolism.

Other mortality causes can be related to improper handling techniques, which can cause disease and gill damage. The skin of all fish has a protective mucous layer to prevent disease. Netting and handling of a striper removes this mucous and when released the fish may contract a disease. The gills are the striper's source of oxygen, and damage to this area due to handling or hooking often results in death.

Proper handling, right equipment, knowing when to release fish and using good judgment will allow many released stripers to be caught again. Release of landlocked stripers does work.

July Expectations

The reservoir stripers have migrated back to the lower one half of the lake. The thermocline has developed and normally exceeds 15 feet, although each reservoir is unique. The stripers will become easier to locate with your sonar as the warmer shallow coves push the fish into the deeper, cooler main channel below the thermocline. A topographical map will locate the old river channel with shallow humps and flats nearby to attract bait fish. Catch and release is not an option in the reservoirs because the mortality is near 100%. Below the dams with cool discharge water, a released fish has a good chance to survive. Fishing the boils is almost a guaranteed catch in July if you present your bait close enough to the bottom to lose a few hook, line, and sinkers. It is dangerous water and illegal not to wear a life jacket.



Fishing Hot Spots



The no fishing zone in front of the dam goes into effect July 15 through September 15. A majority of the adult stripers will be schooled on the old river channel humps from point #13 to #1 at the dam. Hybrids may still be caught in shallow water and upstream of point #13. Catch and release hybrids can still be

successful.

NORRIS LAKE: Good

The fish are small when compared to past years, and the numbers are also down. The largest fish may reach into the teens and are schooled in good quantities when you do find them and are hungry after the spawn. Point #26 downstream to Point #19 is always good on the Clinch side. Big Creek and Cove Creek normally start to see good action in July. Point #10 to Point #14 on the Powell side. It is now catch and kill.

BELOW FORT LOUDOUN & MELTON HILL DAMS: Good

Many of the stripers will go upstream to the discharge at the dams. Put your sinker and hook close to the bottom with plans to lose a few for the most catches. Pulling side planer boards down the banks can also catch fish for miles downstream.
