President's Letter

August 16th Meeting - Jim Negus of the TWRA will be our guest at the August 16th meeting for a "Question & Answer" session. Basically, we have made up a list of questions related to fishing for stripers in East Tennessee; and we have given them to Jim in advance of the meeting so he can research the answers before the meeting.

Jim has been working in Region IV for the past 11 years in reservoir fisheries management under Doug Peterson. He is responsible for the data collection and analysis for Cherokee, Norris, Melton Hill, Tellico, Fort Loudoun, Calderwood and Chilhowee. He writes the annual reports, takes summer water quality samples, gill net, trap net, and electrofish. In addition, he does all of the data entry, except creel, and he creates a lot of the I & E information related to Region IV reservoir fisheries like the "Norris Angler" and certain news releases, i.e. - the gill maggots (Achtheres).

This should be an interesting session that you will not want to miss. Please don't hesitate to give me any questions that you have or bring them to the August meeting at Shoney's.

NSBA - We have been approached by the National Striped Bass Association (NSBA) to participate in the weigh-in for their tournament on Cherokee on December 3, 4 and 5. As you may know, there was some criticism of their procedures during their summer tournament on Cherokee; and I assume that they have made changes to reduce the mortality rate in the upcoming tournament. While the TSBA is not going to be involved with the December NSBA tournament, several members, including myself, plan to be there for at least part of tournament. We would like to see how they operate and possibly open up discussions to determine if there are areas where we can work together for the good of our local fishery as it's in the best interest of both associations to maintain a healthy striped bass population on all of the East Tennessee reservoirs.

Nonprofit - Several times in the past, there have been conversations about whether or not the club should incorporate in some fashion. After the July meeting, several members approached me and said that they could not believe that we were not incorporated. They had just incorporated some businesses, one was nonprofit, and I got the name of a lawyer who specializes in this. I set up an appointment with the lawyer to review our options. Basically, he said that the club definitely should incorporate as a Nonprofit Association which would be called the Tennessee Striped Bass Association, Inc. This would shield all of the members from liability should something happen during one of our events. We would have to develop a set of bylaws and file an annual report with the state. The cost to set this up would be \$400 for the lawyer and a \$100 filing fee for the state. There may be other minor expenses When he was quizzing me about the club to determine if we would qualify, his main concerns were whether or not any club members received any compensation and if we received any money from sources other than the members. The only compensation that I can think of is that the officers have been getting their dues waived. He did not see this as a problem, but we will stop this practice immediately just to keep it clean. As far as receiving money from other sources, I told him that we did get \$100 each from 6 to 8 sponsors. He then wanted to know how much money we received from the members which I guessed as between \$3,500 and \$4,500. He indicated that the percent of money received from outside sources was too low to be a problem. There is no doubt in my mind that the club needs to do this, and it will be on the agenda for the August meeting. I don't think that we are prepared to move forward on this yet as I would want another member to confirm that I have all of the important facts correct.

Displays



The Story of Norris Lake

Norris Dam was the first dam built by the TVA (Tennessee Valley Authority). Construction started on October 1, 1933, only a few months after the agency was created. The gates were closed on March 4, 1936 and Norris Reservoir was completely filled on January 22, 1937. The completed dam helped moderate the disastrous Ohio and Mississippi flood of 1937. The giant drum gates at the top of the spillway were raised for the first time to impound waters that would have swelled a flood more than 600 miles away. The initial cost of the project was \$32,269,027.

The construction of the Norris Project incurred 16,977,720 man hours of labor. During the construction 8 men lost thier lives, and 962 suffered injuries. The project relocated 2,899 families and caused the removal of 5,226 gravesites. Some of the materials used to build the dam are 1,002,300 cubic yards of concrete, and 225,889 bags of grouting for the foundation.

Norris has the largest flood control storage of any TVA dam on a tributary of the Tennessee - at normal maximum pool the reservoir holds 2,040,000 acre feet of water. Norris' two hydroelectric generators turned out the first TVA electric power in the eastern end of the Tennessee Valley and the transmission line from Norris to the Wilson Dam provided the first elements of the distribution system that later spread through most of the valley and beyond.

Norris Lake extends 73 miles up the Clinch River and 56 miles up the Powell River. It has 750 miles of shoreline, and 50 miles of island shoreline giving a total of 800 miles of shoreline. The maximum width of the lake is 1.2 miles with a surface area of 34,200 acres. The watershed area for Norris Lake covers 2,912 square miles. Norris Dam is 265 feet high, and 1860 feet long and is located on the Clinch River at mile marker 79.8 in Campbell and Anderson County, Tennessee. The reservoir is 129 miles long. Norris Lake and the dam were named for George W. Norris, a U.S. Senator from Nebraska. The dam helps control floods in the area, generates electricity, and helps maintain navigation depth on the Tennessee River. Before reaching the Ohio River the water goes through nine different dams, generating electricity at each one.

Located in a ridge and valley region Norris Lake abounds in secluded coves. On these wooded banks TVA established the first demonstration public parks. Later the parks were turned over to the State of Tennessee. Recreational use of the reservoir exceeds that of any other tributary lake. TVA acquired the entire shoreline of the reservoir. Although 56,700 acres of lake land have been sold a continuous shoreline strip dedicated to public recreation has been retained, and 35,300 acres have been transferred or leased to the state of Tennessee and the various counties for public recreation. The state administers two large game management areas, three state parks, and 59 public access sites. There are three county parks. The TVA retains about 22,000 acres for future recreational development.

Lake Norris is a great place for fishing, boating, swimming, and other water sports. Nestled between East Tennessee ridges, Norris Lake points the way to Cumberland Gap and the historic wilderness trail marked by Daniel Boone. With its clear deep water, it produces excellent catches of rock fish, walleye, and bass, as well as the usual species found in other area lakes. June through September night fishing for small mouth bass, crappie, white bass and walleye is a popular activity. Two small wild areas on Norris Lake provide visitors with a mini wilderness experience. River bluff features spring and summer wildflowers and a three mile hiking trail. Hemlock bluff presents spectacular views across Norris Lake from high tree covered bluffs. Museums, scenic hiking trails, and a trail for the handicapped complement the fine trout fishing and canoeing below the dam. A picturesque 18th century grist mill excites the imaginations of artists and historic buffs alike.

The five counties surrounding Norris Lake are Anderson County, Campbell County, Claiborne County, Grainger County, and Union County.

Letter from the Vice President

Melton Hill Dam Trip

T.S.B.A. had a free fishing club event below Melton Hill Dam on July 24. We had 8 boats show up before daylight and fish the area. We had hoped to fish the boils below the dam; however, TVA was not generating that morning. It was in spite of no generation a very educational trip. That's what these events are all about. Us novice fishermen have a chance to learn from the masters. Here's what I learned that morning. To get to Melton Hill Dam take I-40 west and take the first exit past the I40-I75 split (US321 TN95) and go to the right on TN95. You pass over the river, and the ramp is just past it on the right. From the ramp, the dam is about 1.5 miles east. This is an area where you must wear a life jacket. The lock as you approach the dam will be to port. Head all the way up and drift down the side away from the lock.

The first thing I had to do that morning was to catch some bait. I followed Allan downstream or west of the ramp past Jones Island to Paw Paw Creek (2.5 miles). There is a bigger and deeper creek, Caney Creek, further west (5.5 miles). Both creeks are to port as you head downstream. Allan had no trouble getting bait in Paw Paw Creek, but I found it much easier in Caney Creek.

After getting enough bait, we headed back to the dam and I put out lines deep (following the instructions Allan had given at July's meeting). I later learned from Ezell that, when the water is not flowing, it's better to

run the lines on top behind boards.

I had to leave before any generation occurred, so I did not get to fish under those conditions. I did hear from Chet Moore that he was fishing when they came on and caught 6 between 5 and 5:30 PM during a short generation period. Some people caught a few Stripers even in slack water. I caught fish but not Stripers.

It was a beautiful day with good friends. I'll put what I learned to use some other day when they are

generating. Come join us on the next trip.

September Expectations

Early September is much the same as August in the reservoirs. The larger stripers will be in the old river channels near the dam, below the thermocline, trying to find enough cool water with dissolved oxygen in it to survive. The stripers are stressed more than any other time of year, so a catch and release is not possible if it exceeds 20 to 25 inches (4 to 8 pounds) depending on the reservoir. As the cold water is released through the dam, the funnel effect can cause the thermocline to go very deep late in the month, so fish can be caught in excess of 100 feet. Cool water tailrace fishing will continue to be at its best for the entire year. Some of the tailraces may struggle to have a successful catch and release of the larger fish. Wear your life jacket below the dams. It may save you \$200 in fines or even your life.



Fishing Hot Spots

CHEROKEE LAKE: Poor

The best fishing will be within a few miles of the dam. Pulling artificials on

oxygen bubbles by trying to release them.



NORRIS LAKE:

Good

Most of the stripers will be near the dam. Point #9 downstream and in Big Creek and Cove Creek. Artificial bait on downriggers work great. Nighttime still offers a lot of good fishing.

According to the T.W.R.A., dissolved oxygen concentrations are much better than they were last year. Readings taken at four locations by TWRA's Data Collection Department found excellent dissolved oxygen at almost all depths at those locations. To review the data, go to www.TNStripedBass.com. TAILRACE AND DOWNSTREAM: Excellent

Four common methods of fishing below dams all work well.

1) Run up to the boils and lob live bait into the boils and drift downstream.

2) Cast heavy jigs into the boils or cast into schooling fish anywhere you find them.

3) Run side planer boards against the bank with live bait going with the current for miles downstream.

4) Use live bait and a heavy sinker placed near the bottom and go with the current until you find feeding fish.


