## 2005 TSBA Tournament Trail

As you know, the club is constantly trying to come up with new programs to make the TSBA more interesting. For 2005, we have decided to introduce a "Tournament Trail" competition. Basically, we are going to sponsor a total of five tournaments and record the total weights of the Stripers and/or Hybrids caught by each participant in each event. At the end, we will drop everyone's lowest weight and add up their best four weights. The angler with the highest total will be crowned the "TSBA Angler of the Year." We will have a traveling plaque with the year, the winner's name, and the total weight. Also, the winner will receive a monogrammed shirt and cap to commemorate their achievement. The dates for the 2005 tournaments are:

Saturday	August 20	Melton Hill


For each of the above tournaments, we will weigh-in only one striper or hybrid per angler. Live check-in is preferred, but it is not required. The entry fees for the tournaments are as follows.

The fee for each of the Saturday tournaments will be \$11. Ten Dollars of this will be returned 100% to the winners of that particular event - 50% for first place, 35% for second place, and 15% for third place. The remaining One Dollar per person per tournament will go into a fund to buy the plaque and the monogrammed shirt and cap.

The entry fee for the Sunday, May 01 tournament, which is the StriperBowl, will be \$16. Fifteen of this will go towards the Kid's Day fund and the remaining Dollar will go towards the plaque and awards fund. The plaque and prizes will be presented during the September Fish Fry at Anderson County Park.

I really believe that this program will be a lot of fun, and it will be well received by everyone.

# Fishing Hot Spots



## Cherokee Lake

The downstream end of the lake will have good fishing from Point 19 to the dam. Look for surface breaks and feeding gulls. Large schools at times can be found in very shallow water. Live bait is easy to catch in most of the warm coves. The Fort Patrick Henry steam plant will be good all month.

## **Norris Lake**

The Hickory Star area and upstream will be good. The sunny side of the shallow banks will catch some top water fish in the afternoon. Spring Dock near Point 11 and upstream on the Powell River side will be good. Look for the warm water that attracts bait fish. Pull a planer board close to the bank.

## Watts Bar Lake/Melton Hill Lake

The steam plants at Kingston and Melton Hill will have the most predictable catches. The contrast in water temperature will dictate how good the fishing is.

## **Fishing Regulations**

New fishing licenses are required to fish starting March 1. You may want to purchase your license before March to get it at the 2004 price since they will have a price increase for the 2005 season.

It is each fisherman's responsibility to know the rules and stay legal. Changes are normal in the management of our fishing each year, and those changes become effective on March 1. Each river or lake may have exceptions you need to be aware of before exposing yourself to a fine. Example: March 1, 2005 until April 1, 2005 on Norris Lake is 1 each striper bass and must be at least 36 inches. March 1 starts the new 42-inch musky size limit on Melton Hill. Go on line to Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency at www.tnwildlife.org or pick up a 2005 Fishing Regulations book at sporting stores or TWRA offices.

# **Boat Operator Education**

As of January 1, 2005, mandatory boater education became law in Tennessee for boat operators born after January 1, 1989.

Anyone who operates a boat and was born after January 1, 1989 must possess proof of completing the Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency's boating safety exam.

Locations, dates, and times of these exams will be posted on the Internet at http://www.state.tn.us/twra/boated.html or may be obtained by calling (800) 837-6012. Home study books may be obtained by calling (615) 837-6013.

Boaters wanting to take the one-hour exam must first purchase a \$10.00 boating safety exam permit from any agent that sells fishing/hunting licenses. The receipt from this purchase is the "ticket" to take the exam. It serves as admission at the exam locations and becomes a temporary boater safety certificate for those who pass the exam. If you do not pass the exam, this receipt/"ticket" can continue to be used to take the exam as many times as needed.

A wallet card will be mailed within a few weeks of successfully passing the exam. If a card is lost, a duplicate may be purchased from any license agent for \$5.00.

# Fishing Trip

I have been asked a couple of times to tell this story from a few years ago. A friend of mine, Captain Spurgeon Stowe, owns and operates the finest headboat anywhere on the Atlantic. The Miss Hatteras is a 75 foot fishing vessel fast enough to get to the Gulf Stream and back out of Hatteras Inlet, called a headboat because the charge is by the head or per person. Most of the year the Miss Hatteras carries 30 or 40 people out to bottom fish over rocks and wrecks in the Gulf Stream. In the dead of winter, Spurgeon takes the Miss Hatteras out for some different trips including live bait fishing for King Mackerel and chumming and drifting baits for Bluefin Tuna.

A group of my pharmacy buddies and my oldest son just back from a year in Korea decided to take a weekend trip to Hatteras and try our luck with catching Bluefin Tuna. Because we were limited in funds, the headboat was our choice. We left North Broadway in Knoxville at 6PM on Friday on a cold January day for the 650 mile run to Oden's Dock, Hatteras Village, NC. We took two trucks with 2 passengers each and headed East on I-40. The guys in the other truck drank beer the entire trip. We had sleet, snow, wind, and rain the first third of the trip that slowed us down. We changed off to US 64 in Raleigh and continued East on a deserted road that let us make up some time. We pulled into Oden's at 5:30 for a 6:30 departure. Spurgeon was studying the water and the wind and making comments fit for sailors only. The temperature at Hatteras was 30 degrees with a 20-knot north wind. That would make the seas 6 to 8 feet in the edge of the Gulf Stream. It was a rougher day than Spurgeon would normally take. The weather had been worse all week, and he needed to make a payroll so he decided it was a go. After the Captain described the conditions of the day, 9 of the 20 folks gathered at the dock thought better of it and left. The Miss Hatteras left Oden's with the Captain, one mate, and 11 idiot fishermen.

Before we cleared the inlet, the two beer drinkers were green and curled up on the floor of the boat's cabin, done for the day. The seas turned out to be more like 8 to 10 feet, and it was

rough indeed riding out. It was still rough when we hit the blue water and the wall of steam that signaled the Gulf Stream. By that time another of the 11 had joined my friends in the cabin leaving 8 to fish. We divided into 4 teams of 2. One guy held the 80-pound class Penn International, and the other held the holder. We were chumming with cut peices of bait and drifting hooked baits along with it. Rules were we could only boat one fish, and the angler who got it got 1/2 and everyone else got a share of the other half. We were told to keep the rod aimed at the fish and to keep the line tight if we got a hit. It was absolutely required to follow the fish around the boat, and everyone else had to get out of the way.

There was a school of big tuna under us and mixed in were a lot of big King Macs. The Macs are short biters and because we were rigged for Tuna we were just feeding the Kings half our bait and rebaiting for several hours. My son, Doug, and I were taking turns at the stern of the boat. I had just put out a new bait when Mr. Bluefin decided he was hungry. The fish was pulling line off a 40-pound drag fast enough to make it scream and was taking it straight off the bow of the boat. The fish was dragging me, and I dragged Doug through the other 3 teams to the bow of the boat where I cranked for 45 minutes between screaming runs to get my fish in close enough for the gaff. The tuna was 120 pounds, small for a Bluefin, but by far my biggest fish. We hooked and released several others that day and called it a day.

Back at Oden's we grilled the 1/2 share for the 5 in my party, ate, and slept in the adjacent motel. Next morning, we did it all over again. I was so beat up from the day before that I rigged some treble hooks on wire leaders and fished for Kings. Doug and I caught several 30 to 40 pounds. We got off the boat Sunday and drove back to Knoxville in time for work Monday. My two beer drinking friends never held a rod either day and never even got off the floor of the cabin but talked for months about what a great trip it was.

The big Bluefins are at Hatteras every cold winter. Try it sometime. One is enough for me, I think.



# **March Expectations**

New fishing licenses are required to fish in March. March is a transition month for the prespawn stripers. Early month, the stripers roam the deep open water in large schools feeding on small bait. The winter pattern in the early month cold water of about 45 degrees F. may change to upper 50 degrees F. by month end in the shallow sun-warmed longer days. Migration into the shallow incoming rivers and major feeder creeks will develop around the large concentrations of bait fish. The gulls are still worth watching; also look for herons feeding on the sun-warmed shallow flats. Much larger baits start to work well pulled behind planer boards along the bank. Most fish will be caught in the top 20 feet, and the surface action can be good. The steam plants will continue to attract stripers.

# Letter from the Secretary

## **Heads or Tails**

From a boat or off a dock, there is no good way to fall into the lake, especially this time of the year with the water temperature in the 40 to 50-degree range.

It is VERY IMPORTANT to wear your life jacket. Allan Franklin confirmed that the lighter pouch and chest vests that inflate by an air cartridge will not work properly now. Don't use them. You're betting your life on it. Check out the Question of the Month. Bill Cate shared a true story with us. He fell in and almost didn't make it. Don't think it can't happen to you. Please practice safety and attend TSBA meetings.

A good idea would be to double up and take a buddy fishing.

Now that you're safe, let's consider the boat and motor. The bunks freeze up and off it goes. Don't unhook your boat from the trailer until you reach the bottom of the launch. After taking your boat out of the lake, lower the motor and let the water drain. One quick motor crank to spin the water out of the pump helps.
