Cumberland River

The first of two trips to the Cumberland River occurred during the weekend of June 11 & 12. Their were only six members who made the trip primarily because the weather forecast called for rain throughout the weekend and, unfortunately, the forecast was accurate. Some anglers were quite successful and others were not. This was my third trip to this area and I have had varying degrees of success. However, I have learned a lot from these excursions and talking to other anglers fishing in these waters. The following is a brief summary of how I intend to fish the Cumberland river below Cordell Hull Dam on future outings.

One Generator - If there is only one generator running, I will catch about eight small-to-medium size skipjack by angling with size 12 or 14 chartreuse - colored Sabiki rigs from my boat in the relatively calm water at the base of the dam near the wall separating the generators and the spillways. I have had my best success by casting the Sabiki using an ultra-light spinning reel as far as I can into the boils. I let it sink for a few seconds and then reel it in fairly rapidly using a slightly jerky motion. I have found that it is much easier to keep skipjack alive in my bait tank if I add a little Tranquil to calm them down. After I have my skipjack, which should not take long, I would head downstream. You can start fishing anywhere after you reach the trees along the banks. I will attach a skipjack to a free-line behind a planer board which I will run as close to the shady shoreline as possible. This is not easy as there are many obstacles protruding out into the water. You really need a partner or at least have a Minn-Kota trolling motor with auto and co-pilot. You will get snags but this technique can be deadly on stripers. You can keeping trolling at a speed just faster than the current for many miles downstream. Also, you can troll up the Caney Fork which forks off to the left just before the bridge. If it has sufficient flow, you can troll upstream for several miles.

Cumberland River - Cont.

Two Generators - If there are two or more generators running, then I would take my boat up to the quiet waters along the wall separating the generators and spillways and cast my net for large shad. I have never had any trouble getting shad when there are two generators running. It's best to have a 5/8" mesh, fast-sinking net with a long rope as the water is deep. I would then proceed to fish the boils just as you would below Melton Hill. The idea is to rig your shad so that you can drift downstream for a few hundred yards with your bait just off the rocky bottom. You will get snags but the action can be absolutely fantastic. I would make 10 to 15 passes over different parts of the wide boils. If nothing is happening here, I would catch some skipjack. I would then head downstream all the way to the Caney Fork. It's been my experience that it's difficult to fish the Cumberland River if they are releasing a lot of water. The fish are there, but it's not easy to control your boat so you can properly run the shoreline with planer boards. Fishing the Cumberland River itself would be my last resort with two generators running.

Caution - You must remember that fishing below any dam can be dangerous and you need to take the necessary precautions.

First of all, it is mandatory that you wear a Coast-Guard approved life jacket in the waters below the dam. There are signs indicating the zone where you must wear your life jacket. The TSBA recommends that you wear your life jacket all the time especially when fishing in current or at night. Also, never go anywhere near any dam if they are spilling water over the spillway. This is extremely dangerous as your boat will be sucked into the turbulent water if you get too close. Also, if you are near the dam and you hear a siren or see flashing lights on the dam, you must immediately go downstream several hundred yards as they are going to the change the water flow in some way. Don't go back until the lights stop flashing and the sirens are silent.

Cumberland River - Cont.

Next Trip - The next trip to the Cumberland is scheduled for the weekend of July 30 & 31. This will really be a prime time for the river below the dam so you will want to make this trip with us. Make your own reservations by calling Larry at the Budget Motel in Carthage at 615-735-1300. A room with one bed is \$38.50 plus tax and a room with two beds is \$48.50. I expect a large turnout for this event if the weather cooperates a little better. Remember that these waters contain trophy-size stripers, and Mike Smith of the TWRA says that that are state-record-size stripers there. Thirty to forty-pound stripers are not uncommon. Please call me if you have any questions. Also, let me know if you want to partner up with someone and I will see what I can do. It really is easier to fish this area with two anglers in the boat.

Fishing Hot Spots



Cherokee Lake: Hit and Miss Daily

The best fishing will be near the NO FISHING ZONE at the dam. Hybrids can often be caught in shallow water and successfully released in water that exceeds 80 degrees F. Look around all the little islands near the dam that hold baitfish.

Norris Lake: Good

Most of the big stripers will be near the dam. Point #9 downstream and in Big Creek and Cove Creek.

To review the dissolved oxygen level data, go to www.TNStripedBass.com. Click on "TWRA Region 4." Then click on "Water Quality."

Below Fort Loudon & Melton Hill Dams: Good

August is normally the best month of the year to fish the tailrace. Remember, if the bottom doesn't grab your bait occasionally, you are not fishing deep enough.

Any Cold Water:

Good where stripers have access.
Investigate some of these and other rivers:
Cumberland - Caney Fork - Clinch - Little Tennessee.

August Expectations

The larger stripers will be seeking the coolest refuge that is available. Stripers in the larger reservoirs will still have some of last winter's cold water stored at depth and hopefully enough dissolved oxygen to survive. The stripers will move out of the shallow warm coves to the main channel or deep coves near the dam. A good topographical map and fish finder are great fishing tools. Look for unusual humps, bends, and drop-offs on the old river channel below the thermocline. The fishing can be good at night to avoid an unpleasant day trip that has storms, pleasure boaters, and heat. August is a catch and kill month except at some tailraces with a temperature of less than 70 degrees F. It also has some of the best tailrace fishing of the entire year. Wear a good life jacket while fishing tailraces.

Minutes of the June Meeting

Allan Franklin presented "Fishing the Boils." Shown in the video of the O'Neill Outside show fishing below Fort Loudoun Dam, Allan made a point of educating the public on how to take care of the stripers during catch and release. Reel them in quickly and release them immediately without using a net. When fishing below the dams with live bait. be sure to place your bait in a bucket of water while running back up to the dam in order to get 4-5 drifts out of your bait. Keep your motor running so you don't have to restart it often, and fish near the bottom. If you see breaking fish, take your weights off. Keep up with TVA dam generation schedules, and remember they are subject to change without Sometimes the water will turn on unexpectedly; don't be too close to the dam. It is the law to wear your life jacket when fishing near dams. You can also fish when the water is turned off. Drop a down line to the bottom and reel it up slightly. Use planer boards right after the water is turned off and run in circles close but not too close to the dam




NORRIS DAM MARINA SOON TO BE LIGHTHOUSE LODGE & MARINA AT NORRIS DAM


