President's Letter

Hooked on Circles?

During the spring and summer of this year, I have had my share of lost fish. It has been something like, put bait in water, fish hits, bait dies, and fish swims away. I have tried J-Hooks and Circle-Hooks and had the same results. So to say the least, I was not for or against either at this point. Although I didn't, I was even tempted to try treble hooks, and I even have some in my tackle box. Then after fishing several times with a friend who uses only circle hooks, I began to have a little more success. I will have to admit that I was somewhat reserved at first, because I had tried them in the past and had caught a few fish and had missed a few. But after getting some instruction on how to **NOT** set the hook, and how to hook the bait properly, I began to have a better hookup ratio. I would like to note, however, that not all circle hooks are created equal. I have tried the "Circle-Sea" hooks made by Eagle Claw, and I have tried the "Octopus" circle hooks as well. The Circle-Sea has a straight shank on the back, and the Octopus has a bend near the eye of the hook. I was told that the Octopus style would be more likely to deep hook a fish, than the Circle-Sea with the straight shank. Well, I had already bought them and decided to give them a try to see for myself. My first fish with that hook was hooked deep, and the hook could not be removed. So far all the fish on the Circle-Sea has been hooked in the lip, resulting in little to no injury to the fish.

I know that most of us have our preferences as to what type of hook, line, type of fishing, and so on, but don't be afraid to try something different. It could be that the thing that you have been skeptical of or afraid to try might just be something that you will actually enjoy. I am expecting my shipment from Cabelas today that has my big box of new circle hooks.

Know the Law

It seems that, every now and then, you hear someone talking about getting a citation for something that they didn't know was illegal. Sometimes people get into situations that they thought were safe, only to have an accident or a close call. I talk to people fishing on Melton Hill Lake who say that they have no idea that there is a protected size limit on striped bass there. A couple years ago, a fellow had an article written and put in the local newspaper that described his fish with weight and length. The unfortunate fisherman found out later that his fish was not legal to harvest. He was issued a citation and found out the hard way about Melton It is our responsibility to know the laws Hill's slot limit. concerning safe boating and the regulations for the fish that we are fishing for. Don't just take someone's word for it; you need to look it up for yourself. The TSBA website has a link to the current fishing regulations that are posted on the TWRA website. Don't find out the hard way and try to plead ignorance to the law, because that usually doesn't work. Another thing that stands out in my mind is the practice of people getting out of their boat to stand on the concrete wing wall on Melton Hill Dam. You can see people doing it all the time, and probably most of them don't know that it is illegal. But if the police officer there wishes, he can write you a citation.

If you read an article describing a fishing or boating technique, be sure to check it out before you try it. It may have a regulation prohibiting it, or it may just be a dangerous practice. One lake may have a different size or creel limit from another lake. Again read the statewide regulations, and then read the exceptions to statewide concerning the body of water that you intend to fish.

Be safe and be legal.

Fishing Hot Spots



Cherokee Lake: Hit and Miss Daily

The best fishing will be near the NO FISHING ZONE at the dam. Hybrids can often be caught in shallow water and successfully released in water that exceeds 80 degrees F. Look around all the little islands near the dam that hold baitfish.

Norris Lake: Good

Most of the big stripers will be near the dam. Point #9 downstream and in Big Creek and Cove Creek.

To review the dissolved oxygen level data, go to www. TNStripedBass.com. Click on "TWRA Region 4." Then click on "Water Quality."

Below Fort Loudoun & Melton Hill Dams: Good

August is normally the best month of the year to fish the tailrace. Remember, if the bottom doesn't grab your bait occasionally, you are not fishing deep enough.

Any Cold Water:

Good where stripers have access.

Investigate some of these and other rivers:

Cumberland - Caney Fork - Clinch - Little Tennessee.

August Expectations


The larger stripers will be seeking the coolest refuge that is available. Stripers in the larger reservoirs will still have some of last winter's cold water stored at depth and hopefully enough dissolved oxygen to survive. The stripers will move out of the shallow warm coves to the main channel or deep coves near the dam. A good topographical map and fish finder are great fishing tools. Look for unusual humps, bends, and drop-offs on the old river channel below the thermocline. The fishing can be good at night to avoid an unpleasant day trip that has storms, pleasure boaters, and heat. August is a catch and kill month except at some tailraces with a temperature of less than 70 degrees F. It also has some of the best tailrace fishing of the entire year. Wear a good life jacket while fishing tailraces.



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

Minutes of the June Meeting

Allan Franklin thanked everyone for helping to make the Kids Day a success. There were plenty of door prizes and food. Every child received a pair of binoculars. All 20 kids were winners.

Allan gave a presentation on how to fish below a dam. You need a good, stiff rod to get the fish in fast - 40 lb. test to the swivel, 25 lb. test from the swivel to the hook. Use a wide gap hook - Gamakatsu Octopus. Going bigger in size with the hook to get around the lip works better. Save a considerable amount of money using old lead from a damaged/destroyed shad net. Most important, be a courteous boater. Don't run over other boats on your ride back up to the dam.

Question of the Month

How old are your boat trailer tires?

Answer: The time frame was from two weeks to five years.

It is important for you to maintain your tires. Low miles but many years does not make a safe tire. In our case, our tires had low miles but one tire blew out from dry rot when on Interstate 40. When you are inspecting and checking your tires, it is also a good idea to repack your wheel bearings. If you have grease coming out of your back seal, when your hot axle bearings are backed into the cold water, the cold water is sucked into the bearing. If the seal doesn't work for outgoing, it will also not work with incoming, and the cold water will damage your bearings. When you replace your tires, make certain they are boat trailer tires and not just any old tire you put on.
