ALL IT TAKES TO BE A GOOD FISHERMAN

Being observant is a good place to start the education on catching fish. Some of us are somewhat hard of hearing, but let a bait flip or a fish break the water and the hearing is as fine tuned as possible. You can learn some of the language of the sea gulls just by listening and then rush to the spot they are talking about to catch the stripers that are pushing the bait the gulls are after to the top of the water. Be sure to use all the clues being offered to find those stripers, like all the boats in the area coming up on top at full throttle going to the same diving gulls. On a strange lake, it is always good to look for all the fisheating birds because they are going to be close to the most bait fish that are easy to catch and so are the stripers. Smell is also possible to use to find shad. Where there are large numbers of shad in relatively calm water, just put your sniffer in gear and start watching on your fish finder.

No matter how good you think you are, someone will always come up with a better game plan occasionally. So listen to what new tricks or spots they may share with you. If they don't share information, it is not illegal to follow and use your long range glasses to spy on them when on public waterways. On tournament days, follow the best fishermen and observe. Much information is available from websites, magazines, newspapers, marinas, free fishing publications, and the pictures posted for bragging rights. They can tell you what time of year, where caught, what size, and often what kind of bait or plug.

Good communication is always a plus. Good records are also a great way to develop a long-term goal of success in catching stripers, and you can even cross reference some of the information to other rivers and reservoirs. If all the conditions are the same where you caught fish last year, they will also be in the same place year after year. Most things have to be the same to make this statement correct like water temperature, elevation, clarity, pH, high or low pressure, wind, and available fish and bait populations.

Use good equipment that is a proven success. Much of the marketing tries to sell you what they have for sale, and it is not always what will work the best. Most of the highly advertised products are just trying to catch a fisherman, and they don't care if a fisherman catches a fish or not after they have your money. Some of the best spent money as an investment to become a good fisherman may be spent on guides before the first purchase of any fishing gear. Go out with several guides if it is an option because everyone fishes differently. This may stop you from purchasing the wrong equipment you may never use.

The most important feature to becoming a good fisherman is trial and error and then and do it differently the next time. They call that experience and you can only get it from going fishing, going fishing, going fishing, and going fishing some more.

Fishing Hot Spots



Cherokee Lake - Good

Some stripers weighing up to 20 pounds can be caught, but they are not nearly as abundant as the hybrids. Hybrids eight to ten pounds are common. The best fishing is from Point 24 downstream in most of the large coves and creeks that have abundant bait. Fish shallow and do not neglect the banks. Night fishing is great when the alewife is spawning late this month. This is the best month to catch fish on artificial lures.

Norris Lake - Fair

Do not expect to catch a large fish on Norris like in past years, but fish weighing as much as 20 pounds from the stocking in 1999 can be caught. Top water action is at its best this month. Most fish will be in the upper one-half of the lake, in and around the large coves. Fish the shallow, rocky banks and points. Outriggers are very good fishing tools.

Watts Bar Lake/Melton Hill Lake - Good

The steam plant in Kingston will still hold some fish, but expect to catch more fish. They may be larger upstream to the discharge at the dams.

May Expectations

The stripers will be in the headwaters of the rivers and in the major feeder creeks for the spawn. Temperature of the water will dictate when the stripers are most of the time. If the rivers or shallow water exceeds 70 degrees F., the fish will seek out cooler thermal refuge. The gulls and other fish-eating birds are always a good clue that stripers are also there to feed on the same bait fish. The stripers can be at any depth that it chooses, but most will be caught on or near the surface close to the rough, rocky banks and points. Side planer boards or any outriggers work great. It is important to know thermoclines start to develop in slow-moving water this month. Top water action is good in May, and survival of released fish is also great.

Minutes of the March Meeting

John opened the meeting with the announcement that our Shoney's meeting place will close. Our meeting location for next month will be at the Shoney's on Interstate 75 north of Knoxville Exit 122 (Hwy. 61 - Norris-Clinton).

Ken Cutsinger was introduced as the guest speaker. Ken is an enforcement officer and K-9 trainer for TWRA. He is also a taxidermist. Examples of 3 stripers were brought in for display in different stages of preparation. The photo album was passed around of mounts done over the past 20 years of many wildlife, birds, and fish. Preparation for the freezer suggestions were a very wet cloth wrapped around the fish or a plastic wrap. For the skin mount fish he charges \$8.00 an inch for striper and \$7.00 for black bass. A careful measure of length and girth is done to order the Styrofoam preformed filler for the skin. Removal of the skin from the body is done with a long cut on the right or left side of the fish that is to be against the plaque or drift wood mount. All meat must be removed from the head and skin with no less than 13 specialized knives and scraper tools. The skin is then put into a borax solution to remove the fat and body oils. The skin is then mounted over the Styrofoam to dry for about 2 weeks, and epoxy is used to fill all the sunken places on the head and mouth. An air brush is used to paint the fish. The final coat of clear sealer and eyes are put on. A specialized coat is applied to the fins to keep them from cracking and breaking. Ken brought stacks of boater safety books, 2007 fishing regulations books, and angler's guide to Tennessee fish books. He answered questions on no wake zones at commercial docks and swim areas, also the requirement for a boater safety course for anyone born after 1989. The hotline for reporting poaching in East TN Region IV is 1-800-332-0900. Report violations when they are happening.

After the break Chet did the drawing for a lot of nice door prizes. The 50-50 drawing was a nice \$50 dollar cash prize. Fishing reports by Chet Moore for below the dams were very poor. Some of the reports coming form Cherokee and Norris were starting to show signs of changing from deep to shallow water springtime patterns. Norris had reports of catches around Hickory Star up to 33 Bridge and some on the lower half of the Powell side. Cherokee reports were best from point 16 to point 24 with bait very easy to catch. A lot of floating debris is starting to show up on the surface as the lakes are coming up.
