MINUTES OF THE NOVEMBER AND DECEMBER MEETINGS

The Tennessee Striped Bass Association, Inc. met at 7 p.m. on January 18, 2010. The evening started with dinner as usual at Shoney's in Clinton. About two dozen members were present. Erik Engebretsen opened the meeting, recognizing the recent passing of our friend Dick Vornehm. Dick will be greatly missed by his TSBA friends.

Erik announced that TWRA will not host any fish clubs at the Eagle Bend hatchery this year. This is because a large number of clubs wanted to meet there, and the TWRA staff has a limited amount of time available for these meetings. Rather than offend any of the clubs by meeting with a select few, TWRA decided to not host any clubs. This has resulted in the need for us to modify a few of our meeting dates and topics, as noted in the overview below of some of our upcoming meetings:

- *February:* Bill Cate is arranging for Tim Turner to come to our February meeting to discuss fishing with artificial baits.
- *May:* The lake demonstration of how to use planer boards, floats, down lines, etc., previously scheduled for June has been moved to our May meeting.
- June: Bob Leach will discuss why TSBA was incorporated a few years ago and the operational implications that places on TSBA. Also, we will try to get Officer Kim Gibson from TWRA to talk with us about TWRA's enforcement of fishing laws and how we can best contact TWRA when we suspect violations.
- *July:* Mike Smith of TWRA will report to us on the stocking of striped bass and hybrids that occurred in the spring. Note that this will take place at Shoney's.

At the January meeting, Eric Rauch showed slides and discussed the home bait storage unit he built in his garage. He uses two 50-gallon plastic drums, one for keeping the bait and the other as a cool-water reservoir. What is unique about his set-up is that he converted a window air conditioner, replacing the cooling coils with a copper coil that extends into the second drum to cool the water. If you use this technique, be sure to use copper rather than aluminum for the coil because of the corrosive action of the salt on aluminum. The cool water is pumped into the bait reservoir via a 500-gph Little Giant pump that is outside of the tank and runs on standard household current. The pump is outside of the water so that most of the heat from the pump is dissipated into the air, rather than into the water. Water from the bait reservoir returns to the cooling side via gravity flow through a 2-inch PVC pipe. This pipe discharges into a diffuser bucket with filter fabric in the bottom that catches most of the waste from the bait. Three aquarium pumps aid aeration and there is a venturi-like air infuser in the water discharge line to the bait tank. Salt is added (as with a standard boat bait tank). When filling the tank with tap water, be sure to dechlorinate the water beforehand. Eric noted that if you catch blue gill and shad you should not keep them in the same tank as the blue gill will kill the shad.

Lots of good ideas on home bait storage units were shared by other members. Other members who have home bait tanks can share what they've done on the web site and/or at a future meeting.

JANUARY 2010 QUESTION OF THE MONTH:

WHAT DID YOUR LARGEST 2009 STRIPER WEIGH AND IN WHAT MONTH DID YOU CATCH IT?

We had 20 members respond to this question with the following results.

September was the most productive month for catching your "Trophy Striper of the Year," with five members catching their largest in this month. The next most productive month was May, with four members catching their best in this month. The average "Trophy" caught in September weighed 38 lb. and the average "Trophy" caught in May weighed 29.5 lb.

Though the highest number of members caught their best Striper in September and May, the larger freshwater fish were actually caught in other months. The largest of all, two 47 lb. freshwater fish, were caught in April by two of our members. Other members reported catching their largest freshwater fish as follows: 45 lb. in February, 45 lb. in September, and 45 lb. in December.

We also had members who reported catching their largest Striper in the months of February, April, July, August, and December. The months of January, March, June, October, and November either aren't very popular months to fish or are times when the big fish are inactive, based on our members' responses.

This is the third year that I have asked this question. In 2008, we had about the same number of responses, with about 20 to 25 members responding. In 2008, 18 members reported catching their "2008 Trophy" in the July-September time frame. Therefore, 72% of our members caught their largest 2008 Striper in those three months.

In 2007 we had 23 members respond to the question with nine members reporting that they caught their "2007 Trophy" in the month of Au-

gust. The July-September time frame seems to be consistent for all three years.

We had one member who reported going to Chesapeake Bay and catching a 52 lb. fish that was his largest of the year. The following was copied from our Fishing Reports, and I think a lot of our members would like to have more information about this style of fishing. I hope Larry will provide more information and photographs from this trip for us in the future.

Larry reported: "I caught my personal best, a 52 lb. and 3 oz., in December 2009. We also caught a 45 lb., two 40 lb., and several 30 lb. All these fish were released. If you ever get a chance to fish Chesapeake Bay, take it! You won't regret it!!!! These fish were caught on live eels that you can buy for a dollar a piece. We could almost hit the launch with a rock."

Fishing Hot Spots



Cherokee Lake

The downstream end of the lake will have good fishing from Point 19 to the dam. Look for surface breaks and feeding gulls. Large schools at times can be found in very shallow water. Live bait is easy to catch in most of the warm coves. The John Sevier steam plant will be good all month.

Norris Lake

The Hickory Star area and upstream will be good. The sunny side of the shallow banks will catch some top water fish in the afternoon. Spring Dock near Point 11 and upstream on the Powell River side will be good. Look for the warm water that attracts bait fish. Pull a planer board close to the bank.

Watts Bar Lake & Melton Hill Lake

The steam plant at Melton Hill and Kingston will have the most predictable catches. The contrast in water temperature will dictate how good the fishing is.

MARCH EXPECTATIONS

New fishing licenses are required to fish in March. March is a transition month for the pre-spawn stripers. Early month, the stripers roam the deep open water in large schools feeding on small bait. The winter pattern in the early month cold water of about 45 degrees F. may change to upper 50 degrees F. by month end in the shallow sun-warmed longer days. Migration into the shallow incoming rivers and major feeder creeks will develop around the large concentrations of bait fish. The gulls are still worth watching; also look for herons feeding on the sun-warmed shallow flats. Much larger baits start to work well pulled behind planer boards along the bank. Most fish will be caught in the top 20 feet, and the surface action can be good. The steam plants will continue to attract stripers.

On Norris, Boone, and Watts Bar lakes the creel and size limits change from one fish with a 36-inch minimum size limit to two fish at a 15-inch size limit starting April 1.

Fishing Regulations

New fishing licenses are required to fish starting March 1. It is each fisher-man's responsibility to know the rules and stay legal. Changes are normal in the management of our fishing each year, and those changes become effective on March 1. Each river or lake may have exceptions you need to be aware of before exposing yourself to a fine. Go on line to Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency at www.tnwildlife.org or pick up a 2009 Fishing Regulations book at sporting stores or TWRA offices.

TWRA Updates Procedures For Fishing Licenses

TWRA Fishing License: Ordering by Phone or Internet

You can purchase your fishing license by credit card over the telephone by calling TWRA toll-free at 1-888-814-8972. An authorization number will allow you to begin fishing or hunting (in season) the minute you hang up. Please note, regular license fees plus a \$3.95 processing fee will be charged to your credit card when you use the toll-free number above.

Licenses may also be purchased online at TWRA's web site, https://www3.wildlifelicense.com/tn/

There is a \$3.25 processing fee for online license sales.

Note: The Lifetime Sportsman License cannot be purchased online. Applications for this new license may be obtained by calling the TWRA Nashville Office (615-781-6500) or any of the four regional offices.

What To Do If You've Misplaced Your License

All hunting and fishing licenses can be replaced, including the Lifetime Sportsman License. Please verify your address at the time of purchase. Go to any TWRA license agent or TWRA Regional Office for a replacement. All duplicate licenses cost \$7.00.

Resident License Requirements

Resident licenses can be purchased by:

Persons who possess a valid Tennessee driver's license.

Persons who have lived in Tennessee for 90 consecutive days with the genuine intent of making Tennessee their permanent home. Proof of residency required.

Military personnel on active duty in this state and their immediate families, who reside with them, regardless of resident status. Students who are enrolled in a Tennessee school, college, or university for at least six months.

* A Social Security Number is required to purchase a Tennessee hunting or fishing license.

Tips on Charging & Jumping Batteries

With the cold temperatures here, this is a time of year that batteries usually die. Anytime you charge a battery or jump start a battery, you need to follow safety precautions and proper techniques. When charging or jumping batteries, wrong technique can lead to injuries or damage the equipment. If you are ever unsure about anything, consult the manufacturer's instructions or call a professional.

There are some special considerations that one should always keep in mind before charging or jumping any type of vehicle battery. Unknown to many people, batteries do have potential to explode and/or catch on fire. Typically this only happens in the following scenarios:

- The battery to be charged/jumped is damaged
- The battery to be charged/jumped is frozen.
- The battery to be charged / jumped is completely dead and will not hold a charge (old battery)

Thus you should always perform a proper inspection of a battery for damage before charging or jumping. If a battery is frozen, the best practice is to take it to a place that would allow it to gradually rise in temperature. If you know the age of the battery and it is well past its life expectancy, the best practice would be to just replace the battery instead of attempting to charge or jump it.

Bill Cate shared numerous winter fishing tips that will help all of us be more successful in area reservoirs. He noted that now is the time for us to catch the biggest fish. Tips included:

- Fish planer boards in shallow (4' deep) water in the hollows with springs and creeks feeding them, as these water sources will have warmer water which attracts bait fish. Study lake maps to find these areas.
- Fish red clay banks, as the sun will warm the water in these areas faster than rocky areas and attract bait fish.
- Often the big fish are on the bottom, so fish there.
- When using shiners, smaller is generally better especially when the water temperature is less than 50 degrees.
- Cut bait works well in winter.
