I think this equipment is like most other electronic devices that we purchase - before we get comfortable using it "a new and better unit will be available" to compete for our money. But, I do intend to observe the color units in action to learn more about this relatively new fishing tool.

My Boat Bait Tank

In last month's TSBA newsletter, I talked about the importance of the size of the bubbles produced by the aeration system in your boat's bait tank. The most important single thing required to keep your shad happy and healthy is to provide them with a constant, gentle stream of water with thousands of tiny air bubbles circulating around your tank. Since I joined the TSBA several years ago, I've experimented with many different ways of aerating the various bait tanks that I've purchased and constructed. Most of these worked to some degree but not well enough to satisfy me. All I really wanted was to be able to go to bed at night and wake up the next morning to a tank of frisky bait. Nothing ruins a live-bait, fisherman's day any more than shad floating in your tank or gasping for their breath just when you're ready to take off for a great morning of striper fishing.

Of all of the techniques that I've tried over the past five years, the aeration system that works best for me is one that injects the air into the water just before the pump impeller using the venturi concept. This system is standard on the Super Bait Tank II by Ron Vest and possibly others. Many of the veteran, expert TSBA club members use this tank quite successfully and swear by it.

The system I have in my boat is a 40-gallon Blue Water tank that I've modified using various components from the KeepAlive Company. My final setup is extremely similar to the Vest tank with a few minor variations that, in my opinion, make it just about as good as you can get. My first modification was to remove the existing bilge pump and replace it with a KeepAlive air-injection system. This consists of a standard 500 GPH Rule bilge pump and a KeepAlive KA201CB conversion kit. First, remove the blue pump inlet on the standard Rule pump and replace it with the pump inlet provided in the KeepAlive kit. The new base has three suction cups that hold the pump to the bottom of my tank. These suction cups don't work all that well but the pump does stay in place in my tank due to the routing of the hoses. The kit also contains a foam filter which wraps around the pump base to filter the water just before it enters the pump. While this appears to be a good idea, I do not use this filter. It's been my experience that this foam filter is too fine and it clogs too quickly which shuts down the whole system. Throw the foam filter away!! The final items in the kit are an air hose and a clamp which enable you to adjust the amount of air entering the base of the pump. This is extremely important, and it takes a bit of experimenting to get the air flow tuned so that you get thousands of tiny bubbles. The final step in converting my bait tank was to add a KeepAlive 3/4", KA113 directional discharge. This is mounted in

the partition between the bait side of the tank and the pump/filter side by adding a large hole almost 1.8" in diameter. I drilled a small hole and then used a Dremel to get the proper hole size. The discharge is to be located so it's about halfway between the top of the water and the bottom of the tank when the tank is full.

The beauty of the KeepAlive discharge system is twofold. First of all, it's fairly large which reduces the water flow resistance. This maximizes the flow rate and keeps the velocity to a minimum. The result is a high-flow discharge which is spread out over a large enough area to make to stream strong, gentle and not turbulent. The final feature that I like is the fact that the discharge is directional. The most common technique used in the bait tanks that I've seen is to discharge the water/air bubble mixture horizontally into the tank. However, I've found that it's much better to angle the discharge downward so that the water/air mixture enters the bait tank at approximately 45 degrees. The air bubbles must now travel downward for a short distance before they start ascending to the surface. The result is that the bubbles stay in suspension much longer than if they were introduced into the tank horizontally. This drastically increases the contact time between the circulating air bubbles and the water in the tank which allows more oxygen to be absorbed into the water. You still get a great circular motion around the tank. In fact, I have a few tiny air bubbles that completely encircle the tank before popping. I don't think that you can get any better than that.

One minor problem that I've noticed with my system is that the tiny bubbles seem to linger on the surface for a longer period of time before

popping which causes some unwanted surface foam. A few drops of Foam Off resolves this issue.

While I have spent many frustrating hours trying to perfect my tank, I think that I've finally got it right. The only problem that I've created with my bait tank is that I can't think of any way to further improve it, so I have to move on to other parts of my boat to satisfy my need to tinker.

Fishing Hot Spots



Cherokee Lake: Good on Most Days

The best fishing will be near the NO FISHING ZONE at the dam. Hybrids can often be caught in shallow water and successfully released in water that exceeds 80 degrees F. Look around all the little islands near the dam that hold baitfish. Bait is much harder to catch on the lower half of Cherokee than normal - much easier above 25E bridge to the headwaters.

Norris Lake: Good

Most of the big stripers will be near the dam. Point #9 downstream and in Big Creek and Cove Creek.

The best information you can have in the summer comes from water quality reports on temp and oxygen at depth.

Below Fort Loudoun & Melton Hill Dams: Good

August is normally the best month of the year to fish the tailrace. Remember, if the bottom doesn't grab your bait occasionally, you are not fishing deep enough.

Any Cold Water:

Good where stripers have access. Investigate some of these and other rivers: Cumberland - Caney Fork - Clinch - Little Tennessee.

August Expectations

The larger stripers will be seeking the coolest refuge that is available. Stripers in the larger reservoirs will still have some of last winter's cold water stored at depth and hopefully <u>enough</u> dissolved oxygen to survive. The stripers will move out of the shallow warm coves to the main channel or deep coves near the dam. A good topographical map and fish finder are great fishing tools. Look for unusual humps, bends, and drop-offs on the old river channel below the thermocline. The fishing can be good at night to avoid an unpleasant day trip that has storms, pleasure boaters, and heat. August is a catch and kill month except at some tailraces with a temperature of less than 70 degrees F. It also has some of the best tailrace fishing of the entire year. Wear a good life jacket while fishing tailraces.
