Janine's Fish Fry Recipes

Deep Fried Striper

Cut striper fillets into 1 to 1 1/2 inch pieces.

Dip fish in batter consisting of 2 cups Aunt Jemima Original Pancake Mix, 1 1/4 cups milk, 1/4 cup beer, 2 eggs.

Deep fry at 360 degrees in canola oil or corn oil.

Baked Striper

Cut striper fillets into 1 to 1 1/2 inch pieces.

Place in baking dish with butter and lemon pepper. (I only use the lemon pepper from Fresh Market that comes in the small plastic bags.)

Sprinkle very lightly with Zatarain's Seasoned Fish-Fri Mix just to give it a taste.

Bake at 350 degrees for 35-40 minutes.

Tartar Sauce

Mix Miracle Whip with Sweet Salad Cubes.

Boating Law Reminders

It is unlawful to ride on seatbacks, gunwales, transoms, or pedestal seats while above an idle speed.

A U. S. Coast Guard approved personal flotation device must be worn by each person on board vessels being operated within specifically marked areas below any dam.

Unless otherwise marked, all vessels operating within 300 feet of a commercial boat dock must do so at a slow wake speed regardless of whether or not the area is marked by buoys. "No wake" is defined as a vessel traveling at or below idle speed, or at such speed that the boat or its wake (waves) is not sufficient to cause possible injury or damage to other persons, boats, or property.

Fishing Hot Spots



Cherokee Lake

The downstream end of the lake will have good fishing from Point 19 to the dam. Look for surface breaks and feeding gulls. Large schools at times can be found in very shallow water. Live bait is easy to catch in most of the warm coves. The Fort Patrick Henry steam plant will be good all month.

Norris Lake

The Hickory Star area and upstream will be good. The sunny side of the shallow banks will catch some top water fish in the afternoon. Spring Dock near Point 11 and upstream on the Powell River side will be good. Look for the warm water that attracts bait fish. Pull a planer board close to the bank.

Watts Bar Lake/Melton Hill Lake

The steam plants at Kingston and Melton Hill will have the most predictable catches. The contrast in water temperature will dictate how good the fishing is.

Fishing Regulations

New fishing licenses are required to fish starting March 1. It is each fisherman's responsibility to know the rules and stay legal. Changes are normal in the management of our fishing each year, and those changes become effective on March 1. Each river or lake may have exceptions you need to be aware of before exposing yourself to a fine. Go on line to Tennessee Wildlife Resources Agency at www.tnwildlife.org or pick up a 2007 Fishing Regulations book at sporting stores or TWRA offices.

March Expectations

New fishing licenses are required to fish in March. March is a transition month for the prespawn stripers. Early month, the stripers roam the deep open water in large schools feeding on small bait. The winter pattern in the early month cold water of about 45 degrees F. may change to upper 50 degrees F. by month end in the shallow sun-warmed longer days. Migration into the shallow incoming rivers and major feeder creeks will develop around the large concentrations of bait fish. The gulls are still worth watching; also look for herons feeding on the sun-warmed shallow flats. Much larger baits start to work well pulled behind planer boards along the bank. Most fish will be caught in the top 20 feet, and the surface action can be good. The steam plants will continue to attract stripers.

On Norris Lake, the creel and size limits change from 1 fish with a 36- inch minimum size limit to 2 fish at 15-inch size limit starting April 1.

Winter Stripers

As these fishing tips are being put on paper, the temperature is 10 degrees and expected to be very cool for the next week. Then we have a full moon on Ground Hog Day in February. Steam plant fishing is as good as you can expect it to be near the discharge area for the next month. Also find the warmest water in the reservoirs or just find the gulls. The bait fish are attracted to the warm water so the game fish will be there to eat. The larger the contrast and the contrast area from the rest of the water system, the better the fishing will be.

Gulls are the best fish finder there is in the cold water months. They are better than Lowrance, Humminbird, or Garmin because they make a living at it. For those that are not already aware of it, the stripers and gulls work together as they have for many eons. Having fished for fresh water stripers for the past 30 or more years, many of us have noticed a transition from no gulls to abundant. I will speculate that, as the dams created large reservoirs and waterways with bait fish, the migrating gulls started to find the opportunity to use the stripers feeding to feed themselves as they did in the oceans. The warmest water available is where the

forage fish will be found and so will the stripers and gulls. Many days the bait will stay deep enough that the gulls cannot dive enough to feed until the stripers decide to feed. That is when you will see them sitting on the water or bank with their scouts out looking for the stripers to push the bait to the surface. The gulls then talk in the language they understand, and from all directions they converge into a small area in a hover and dive over the stripers and bait. Most of us fishing for the striper have also learned some of the gull language, and you will hear the roar of all the outboard motors within sight headed to the same spot at top speed when the gulls start to dive. The fishermen become much more aggressive as the number of fishermen chasing the gulls increases. The aggressive fishermen will often run right into the middle of the school of fish for a single cast that may catch a fish and scare the school away before anyone else gets there. It seems that stripers are the most sensitive to noise and motion in the cold months. The correct way to approach is slow down and stay a full cast distance away from the diving gulls. It may be time to pull out the popcorn and keep the gulls diving so much of the time that the aggressive fishermen decide they are no longer going to the boat that is throwing food to the gulls. Then you can put your bait out and troll without getting run over.

Minutes of the January Meeting

Ezell Cox passed out an old striper cycle chart made from records of his fishing on Norris more than 10 years ago. Some of the information is out of date due to some changes like the introduction of alewife and a higher lake level elevation T.V.A. maintains. Gulls are another factor that has continued to develop from none to abundant in the winter. The chart shows factors like monthly average surface temperature, thermocline depth, spawn periods, lake turnover time, where, when, and how to fish Norris. The presentation continued about what kind of bait to use, what size, and where and how to get and keep it through the changing seasons of the year. "Match the hatch" was the message intended to say feed the stripers what they are eating.

<u>Pointers</u>: 1. Shiners are more active than shad in cold water below 50 degrees. 2. Except using shiners in the winter, the best quality bait can be found below Douglas Dam the whole year. 3. The ideal temperature for stripers to be feeding is 47 to 67 degrees. 4. Most stripers are caught within the first two minutes of placing the bait in the water. 5. Cooler water holds more oxygen for your bait. Don't change the water temperature more than seven degrees.

After a break Chet Moore did the drawing for the door prizes, and the 50-50. He then presented and explained a new fishing tool to everyone. The Directional Planner Board is a small inexpensive outrigger that can go out 45 degrees from the boat and, with the flip of the fishing line, pulling it will reverse to the opposite side of the boat pulling it. No right and left needed.

John Seiber then asked for fishing reports. Norris and Cherokee had some good reports where the gulls diving showed where the stripers were feeding. The report from below the dams was poor with much effort and no catches.

There was then talk about the Kingston steam plant tournament to be held February 3, 2007 and the Disabled Sportsman Tournament scheduled for March 24.
