December Expectations

Since the lake temperature is homogenized top to bottom now, stripers will be free to roam the waters top to bottom, bank to bank. and end to end in search of baitfish concentrations. This sometimes makes stripers difficult to locate, so finding the large schools of baitfish will often be easier. A great way to find the right places to look for fish is from past history. Look at the last few years of information available on fishing websites, articles, pictures, and magazines. Many times the best clue is to find the largest baitfish concentrations that will seek out the warmest, most stable temperatures. The winter months bring some of the best surface feeding and the RE-TURN OF THE GULLS will help find the stripers. Cold water temperatures will change the feeding habits of the striper so be aware of the slower metabolism and the need to use smaller bait and lures as the temperatures dip below 50 degrees. Catch and release also is an option again. Winter is a great time to be on the water, but it also requires some preparations to make it a safe, uneventful, fun trip.

Bud White Wins the Powell River Fall Classic

On Sunday, November 4, 2012, a group of determined fishermen set out on the Powell River side of Norris Lake to compete in the Powell River Fall Classic (PRFC). The PRFC was a follow up to the Powell River Striper Championship held in the spring. Flat Hollow Marina was the starting point of what turned out to be a very competitive day of fishing. Fish were located far upstream in areas where most of the participants had never fished.

Fifteen anglers were entered in the contest, but there could be only one winner. After a strong showing in the spring event, Bud White was able to continue his mastery of the Powell River winning first place with a two fish total of 64+ inches and the big fish prize with a striper just over 32". Team Steffe (Doug and Ezell) was a close second and the Nate Bailey team finished third.

Striper Slayers Cherokee Challenge

I was so inspired by the two tournaments hosted by Nathan **Bailey on Norris** Lake, that I decided to host a striper/ hybrid tournament on Cherokee Lake. I really believe that tournaments are a great way to have fun and make friends. They also provide the opportunity for experienced anglers to share their knowledge with others about responsible fishing.



Fishermen, conservationists, professional guides and now tournament coordinators Bud White and Mike Allen cordially invite you to attend the striper/hybrid tournament they are sponsoring this December.

Striper Slayers Guide Service and Sunny Marine will host the Cherokee Challenge on Saturday, December 1, 2012. The event will begin at the German Creek Dock, with registration beginning at 7 a.m. Blast off is at 8 a.m., and weigh-in will be at 2:30 p.m.

This will be a catch-and-release yardstick tournament. The entry fee will be \$50 per boat and \$20 for the big fish side pot. The two longest stripers combined with the two longest hybrids will win first place. There is a trophy and cash award for first, second, and third place. Striper Slayers Guide Service will donate planer boards to second and third place winners. Sunny Marine will donate gift cards for door prizes!

This event will take place weather permitting and is open to everyone!

Some Advice on Fall Striper Movements

Fishing in East Tennessee lakes can be a challenge in the fall season. A month ago, the mature stripers were mostly down the lakes in the deeper, cool, oxygen-rich waters near the dam. Then the waters began to flow through the dams and the temperatures began to cool, releasing the fish from the confines of their late summer refuge. Within days these fish are on a major move; many of them are stressed from low oxygen, a lack of food and a slow metabolism from the deep cold waters. Their instincts are to feed and seek the huge schools of bait which have formed in the upper waters of the feeder rivers and large creeks of the lakes. We believe that current flow, forage scent and shallow-water bait concentrations draw the striper great distances to these areas.

These fall bait concentrations can be found in the nutrient rich, warm, shallower areas of your lake, with flows. This concentration can move daily or even hourly, based on water temp. Fishing the upper-most concentrations and being close to the occasional feeding packs will catch fish. Artificial baits trolled through schools can work, but frisky live bait seems to work the best. A spread of different size baits will help determine the best size for the fish in the area, but a larger size usually works the best. Presenting down lines near the bottom of the bait balls or close to the bottom can attract the fish to your bait over the school of small forage. Planer boards pulled with long, lightly weighted lines or shorter un-weighted lines will help cover wider areas.

As the rivers and creeks get colder, the bait concentrations move down the lake, following the warmer deeper water. When the surface waters cool to the 40's and below we then transition into the winter striper pattern, when artificial baits will start to work better than live bait. Good luck with finding the BAIT concentrations and fish!

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Outlook for current fishing spots

CHEROKEE LAKE

The stripers have been scattered all over the reservoir, but they have migrated to where the most abundant baitfish are concentrated for the winter. Looking for the large concentrations of baitfish and bait-eating birds is a good way to find stripers/hybrids with breaking fish on the surface again being likely. The gulls returning for the winter will be a helpful tool in finding the feeding fish. The premium locations will be in or near the main channel where the water is deepest with less change in temperature around mid-lake and downstream. The larger stripers that have survived the summer stress are quickly recovering and putting on the weight, so catch-and-release will be successful again. We should see some 25 pound stripers in Cherokee by spring.

NORRIS LAKE

THE SIZE (36 INCH) AND CREEL LIMIT (ONE) CHANGES IN NORRIS LAKE REGULATIONS begin in November. Find the large schools of baitfish by locating gulls, whether feeding or not, and looking for surface feeding fish. Other bait-eating birds are scarce on Norris to help find the baitfish, but the gulls and a good fish finder will get you in the right area on the lake. The premium locations will be in or near the main channel where the water is deepest with less change in temperature around mid-lake and downstream. Good catch and release practice is successful even with the largest striper in the cool waters of the winter months. The best fishing is around the gulls in the large deep coves and main channel.

WATTS BAR & MELTON HILL

The striped bass bite in the tail- race often moves downstream for the coldest months of winter in front of the major coves or where you find the most baitfish. The Kingston Steam Plant often has large concentrations of baitfish, especially if the warm water discharge influences the areas water temperature. The baitfish will often find the warmest water. The cooler, longer nights will equalize the temperature in the coves and river to allow the bait to use the river more, so look for the sun-warmed banks. Top water bites are common, so look for the breaking fish and be prepared to cast or pull the planer boards across the action. The survival of released fish in the winter months is great. The fish in Watts Bar & lower Clinch Watts Bar have contamination warnings so should not be harvested.


