October Expectations

Lake turnover takes place through the month of October in the reservoirs of Tennessee. As the lake is homogenized, stripers will be free to roam the waters top to bottom, bank to bank, and end to end. This sometimes makes stripers difficult to locate because you have to find them on a daily basis. A great way to find the best places to look for fish is from past history. Look at the last few years of information available on fishing websites, articles, and magazines. Many times the best clue is to find the largest baitfish concentrations. October is also the start of some surface feeding. Catch and release also is an option again. The scenery is wonderful on the water this month. The lack of storms, heat and humidity, combined with the lack of boat traffic, makes it a welcome season.

Minutes of the July meeting

With approximately 45 members in attendance, President Doug Steffe opened the meeting by introducing new members and the evening's speaker, Bud White.

Bud's presentation on river fishing featured a video on finding and catching large striped bass. Bud's video *How to Catch Monster Stripers in the River Part 1* and *Part 2* are available for you to view on YouTube. In a nutshell, Bud begins targeting river stripers in the spring when the water warms to the high 50's. He suggested the best

way to locate stripers is to pull multiple planer boards and move quickly, stopping only when he identifies a spot which holds fish. Bud sets his bait from five to seven feet behind the planer board to keep the bait from swimming into heavy cover. In deeper water, he also fishes down lines. For big fish, he advocated the use of very heavy bait casting tackle equipped with 40 to 50 pound monofilament line and 7/0 to 10/0 hooks. Bud matches his bait to the prevalent forage in the river he fishes and notes that bigger bait is always better.

After a brief break, Doug Steffe informed the crowd that TDEC had not yet replaced the missing, damaged or nonexistent fish consumption advisory signs at several boat ramps and bank fishing locations that are popular with striped bass anglers on Watts Bar Lake.

Doug mentioned club member Bill Ballou's rod building and repair skills and directed members to ask Bill about their rod repair needs.

Ken, who got into this business after earning a degree in Wild-

life Biology from Michigan State University, has been perfecting the art and science of taxidermy for over 20 years. He uses modern, proven methods for tanning all trophies and prides himself on the quality of work he can provide within a typical turn around time of 12 weeks. His business accepts specimens dropped off or mailed to his shop, which is located in Lafollette, TN.

Ken advises his customer to "treat any trophy like a piece of meat you are going to eat. This means keeping the specimen iced down until it is stored in a freezer." For fish, Ken advises you to wrap the animal in a soaking wet towel. Place that bundle into a plastic bag and then store the whole thing in the freezer.

Outlook for current fishing spots

CHEROKEE LAKE

The No Fishing Zone at the dam ends September 15, 2012. Late summer brings cooler days and longer nights. The striped bass and alewife that have been restricted to the deeper, cooler water are now free to scatter all over the reservoir. This will allow them to migrate to where the bait-fish are concentrated. Looking for the large concentrations of baitfish and bait-eating birds is again a good way to find stripers/hybrids. Fish breaking on the surface is likely, especially early mornings. The baitfish are much more abundant in the headwaters and are often visible on the surface. Game fish are quick to find them, giving you a surface feeding opportunity to cast at. The premium locations have done a complete change from the dam: look in the upper most parts of the reservoir but stay in locations that have lots of bait. The larger stripers that have survived the summer can quickly recover from being stressed, making catch-and-release successful again.

NORRIS LAKE

The thermal trap on Norris is normally gone by early October, allowing once again for fish to move freely throughout the lake. Often baitfish are much more abundant on the shallow incoming water of creeks, coves and rivers so that is where the most game fish will also go to feed. Finding large schools of baitfish or looking for surface-feeding fish in the early morning can be the most effective way to find fish. The bait-eating birds are scarce on Norris, making them of limited use to help find the baitfish. Good catch and release practices will again be successful, even with the larger striper as they recover from the stress of summertime.

WATTS BAR & MELTON HILL

The striped bass bite in the tail race and downstream river will remain good as the water temperature cools from the lowering of the upstream reservoirs to winter levels. Eventually, the cooler, longer nights will equalize the temperature in the coves and river, allowing the bait to utilize the river. The tail race below the dams will stop being a premium location for stripers, so look downstream around the major coves. The release schedule plays a major role in the quality of fishing below the dams and it seems to be much better with flow. Look for the breaking fish and be prepared to cast or pull the planer boards across the action. Be at the right place at the right time by looking up release schedules on the TVA website. Limited handling of the fish can improve the survival of released fish. The fish in Watts Bar & lower Clinch Watts Bar have contamination warnings so should not be harvested.

Tennessee Angler Recognition Program

What are our options when that big fish comes along? Some may have the resources to have a replica or skin mount made, but most of us just take a picture and look at it occasionally for the memory. TWRA provides a recognition program for trophy length fish that presents an artistic certificate worthy of framing, with your name, date and details of the catch. This program is designed to acknowledge anglers for outstanding sport fishing accomplishments, encourage catch-and-release of trophy fish, and provides the TWRA with information on fish caught throughout the state.

Catching a striper over 40" or a Hybrid over 28", regardless of weight, qualifies for this award. While out there fishing for our striper, a lot of times we also catch other species that can earn a certificate, such as small mouth (20"), large mouth (24"), walleye (28"), blue catfish (38") and even Musky (40").

The TARP features five levels of angler recognition. Anglers catching a fish that meets or exceeds the minimum length requirements will receive a Trophy Fish Certificate.



The TARP certificates feature Joseph R. Tomelleri artwork representing the species caught by the applicant and are suitable for framing.



The other four levels include: Master Angler I (five trophy fish, any combination); Master Anger II (five different trophy size species); Master Angler III (ten different trophy size species); and Master Angler IV (Fifteen different trophy size species). Certificates, patches, gift tackle packages, and trophies are awarded as you earn a new Master Angler level.

Having an application, obtained from the link below, along with you on your fishing trip can make the submission process easy to complete. We hope you will participate in this worthwhile and rewarding program.

Forecasting the Perfect Striper Fishing Trip

Back in 2004, as Hurricane Ivan made it's way north towards Tennessee, I happened to be fishing below Melton Hill dam. The heavy rains had the river really moving and the sidewalk below the dam was submerged. Once the rains let up, the low pressure system moved through and this drove the fish crazy and we caught all the stripers we wanted over the following two days. Fish were constantly breaking topwater in front of the dam. I kept this memory stored away in my mind and I always thought the next time a tropical low pressure system came through, the place to be was below the dam.

Fast forward to September 2011: while fishing with Larry Dahlberg to tape an episode for The Hunt for Big Fish, Todd Asher called and asked if I had seen the forecast. He mentioned a tropical storm approaching, and I immediately thought of Ivan in 2004. I told Larry Notice Hurricane Ivan's path through we'd have a really good Tennessee back in 2004. chance at landing some



stripers if we time it right, so we decided to go striper fishing the last day he was in town, and the rest is history.

In a nutshell, there was a reported 5-6 inches of rain that fell on Monday September 5, 2011 (Labor Day). This amount of rain flooded the downstream creeks and pushed a lot of the bait out of these creeks. We noticed large amounts of bait right up against the dam to begin the day. It was still raining when we got there and immediately caught a few fish, but was somewhat slow. We go downriver and see nothing, then come back up. The skies cleared as the



low pressure system had moved over Tennessee and the fish went wild. In about 2 hours, we caught over 30 fish all in the 20 to 30pound class. Several doubles and triples were caught all on artificial lures. Oh, by the way, we were the only boat on the water that day. We could have caught fish Tropical Storm Lee's forecasted path in on live bait, but when the action is

this good, there is no need because we would have ran out of bait very quickly. It pays to pay close attention to the weather forecast and the next time one of these systems comes through Tennessee, it will be a wise decision to get out the raingear and fish the low pressure system.


